VENTS A hot head is

A hot head is an uncomfortable head, so see if the helmet has vents and if they are easily operated by a gloved hand. Vents can cause extra wind noise on a helmet at speed, so ensure they close securely when not in use. With an adventure lid, good venting at slow speed is also important for off-road use

PEAKS

A large peak may help when it comes to shading your eyes from the sun, but without decent air channelling it will act like a sail at speed, putting unwelcome strain on your neck muscles

REMOVABLE LINING

This is especially important if you are planning off-road use where you will exert yourself more and possibly even get the lid's lining dusty

VISOR REMOVAL

You may have to remove the visor to give it a serious clean. Check how easily this is achieved because, unlike road lids, adventure ones often lack quick-release visors



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THE RIDE PRODUCT TEST

Adventurestyle helmets

Looking for a lid to match your adventure bike? Here are RiDE's pick of the crop

YOUR TESTER



Jon Urry Has ridden in more helmets than most 20-year served bike journalist and self-

confessed geek Urry has tested more crash helmets in his career than he cares to remember. It does mean he is well-placed to know what works.

DVENTURE BIKE SALES are on a high, with more and more riders turning to these high-bar do-it-all bikes for their twowheeled transport. And this gradual change in motorcycle style also often necessitates a swap in kit as adventure bikes open up a whole new riding proposition - with many deciding a peaky lid is the way to go.

But choosing the right one can be a minefield. Pick the wrong one for you and you can end up with your neck wrenched by poor aerodynamics as

the peak battles the wind flow on the motorway, or sweating away with poor airflow if you ever head down a green-lane or get stuck in traffic. And that's aside from the normal helmet buying factors like noise, stability, venting and comfort.

With this in mind, we have assessed a selection of adventure lids for their riding ability at slow and high speeds and in every riding situation. With prices varying from £249.99 to £549.99, there is an adventure lid out there for most budgets.

How we tested them

- > WEIGHT Using a set of digital scales, we weighed each helmet as they would be ready for road use, which means any Pinlock systems fitted and the visor attached. A heavy lid can put extra strain on your neck, leading to fatigue, so a lightweight lid can be an advantage when it comes to touring, for example.
- > FEATURES A simple visual checkpoint with items such as a Pinlock, helmet bag, removable lining, vents, integrated sun visor, peak extender, ability to use goggles and helmet fastener all assessed and scored.
- > EASE OF USE Using a gloved hand, the lid's main features were assessed while riding a bike. We also assessed how quick and easy it was to remove the visor completely to allow it to be thoroughly cleaned.
- > NOISE Using a sound pressure meter and a microphone located within the ear cavity of the crash helmet, we recorded the maximum interior noise levels at 60mph.
- > STABILITY AT SPEED The peaks on adventure lids often cause excessive drag and lift, leading to neck ache. We



assessed how they coped with a 60mph ride.

- > COMFORT Each lid was worn on our test route to assess its comfort levels at various speeds.
- > VENTING The effectiveness of the vents were taken into account at both low and high-speed riding; crucial if you're heading off-road.

RATED THE RIDE PRODUCT TEST

Schuberth E1 £549.99 (graphics from £599.99) www.bikerheadz.co.uk

The only flip-front lid in our test, the Schuberth is also the only one with a SHARP rating, though three out of five stars isn't great. Feeling far more enclosed than other adventure lids, you would struggle to know the E1 wasn't a conventional helmet once on, but it is heavy as a result. You get a five-year warranty, the Pinlock arrives fitted and you can add an E1 intercom kit (£239.99) if you wish. Although it can't be used with goggles, the peak is two-way adjustable and the visor easy to remove.

On the road, it has a very small field of vision compared to other lids, which makes you feel a touch claustrophobic and it pushes on your forehead. The sun visor is easy to locate and use, as are the vents but you have to be careful not to catch the peak as it pops out of its fixings with little pressure. It was very stable at speed and felt like a normal flip-front road lid - just with adventure styling.





BMW GS Carbon £425 (graphics from £475) www.bmw-motorrad.co.uk

At £425, the Carbon is well priced and pleasingly it doesn't come emblazoned with GS logos, just a small BMW Motorcycles on the back. Nice and light, the fit is snug but not uncomfortable and it has neat features such as an adjustable peak, is communication-system ready and the visor is simple to remove so you can use goggles instead. A large front vent has a plastic cover that pops off to allow maximum ventilation but was the noisiest on test.

Feeling incredibly light to wear, the Carbon has a huge field of vision but is a very noisy lid that is certainly leaning to the off-road rider. Annoyingly, we found a buzz/ rattle at about 60mph that we couldn't trace back to any one component. The vents are excellent at low and high speed, but the forehead one is tricky to locate and operate while on the go while the chin strap is oddly long.





Arai Tour-X 4 £499.99 (graphics from £579.99)

The Tour-X 4 is fairly basic in its operation but does tick all the right boxes and feels typically well made. The visor system is retained by plastic screws which will snap off in an accident and therefore needs a coin/screwdriver to remove but once off, the screws helpfully remain attached to the peak and the lid can be used with goggles. The fit is comfortably snug but the vents are fairly small.

On the road, the Arai's lining is a bit scratchy on the forehead but otherwise the fit is good and the huge number of vents (plus two visor vents) work well at speed and are surprisingly effective at a slower pace once you open the mesh-covered front ones. The peak looks like it will catch badly in the wind but, in reality, its small aero channels are quite effective at holding it stable and reducing it pulling on your neck.





Klim Krios Pro £525 (graphics £525) www.adventure-spec.com

With its carbon shell, the Krios is an extremely light lid and it looks pretty cool due to the exposed weave. A unique feature is the 'Transitions' UV-responsive visor (you also get a spare clear visor) and the visor system requires no tools to remove and can be used with goggles. Not everyone will like the magnetic fid-lock chin strap, which is a bit disconcerting at first but it is very easy to operate once you get used to it. A small opening means the Klim is a struggle to put on and take off and once on it is a very tight fit, so try before you buy and don't assume your size.

On the road, the Transitions visor is excellent, taking the glare off like a dark/smoke visor but the lining is overly solid and gives the impression more of a motocross lid than a road one while also being quite noisy. Stability at speed is very impressive thanks to good aerodynamics and the vents also work well.

RATED THE RIDE PRODUCT TEST

AGV AX-9 £399.99 (carbon version from £469.99)

The AGV has a feeling of quality, with its visor removal screws metal (they do scuff a bit when undone) and the overall level of finish high. It's pleasingly light to wear and has a wide field of vision with a very comfortable lining. Although the peak can be adjusted, you need to fit inserts that reduce the visor's opening to do so, which is a bit annoying, AGV sells an Ark Intercom (£249.99 plus £14.99 adapter) for the AX-9.

On the road, the AGV feels plush with a huge field of vision and good sound deadening, though the peak does catch a bit in the wind when you raise your head, as it lacks aero cut-outs. The vents are effective and easy to locate and the chin vent's plastic cover can be removed for a good amount of low-speed airflow. A plush feeling lid but one whose peak does catch the wind, so not great for touring.

A lid pleasingly stacked full of features considering its low price tag, the Nolan has a removable chin bar that means it can also be used as an open face lid. Compatible with goggles, the peak is adjustable, there is an integrated sun visor, simple visor removal system (a Pinlock comes fitted) and as well as a five-year guarantee, the lid is ready for the N-Com communication system (£159.99).

Once on, the lid is very comfortable and feels roomy and the sun visor has a neat system where it locks in place to one of four positions, with a push of a button retracting it fully. On the road, the Nolan seems really loud with a load of wind noise (it recorded third-highest at 110.0dB), but its lining is very well padded and comfortable with a snug feel. The vents are a bit tricky to locate and aren't great at low speed but the peak is very stable when cruising and doesn't catch the in wind.

Shoei Hornet ADV £449.99 (graphics from £539.99)

The Hornet ADV retains a visor-release mechanism similar to Shoei's road lids,

meaning removing it takes seconds (the peak's fastenings are ¼ turn fixings). Nice features include a five-year warranty, ear pads to reduce noise levels, an intercomready interior, removable chin guard and breath deflector, an emergency quick-release lining system and a highly vented (non-adjustable) peak to reduce turbulence. Shoei recommends it is not worn without the visor and goggles.

Once you get over the quite-snug fit (it squeezes the cheeks slightly), on the road it's very comfortable. Surprisingly, there is quite a lot of wind noise but the large amount of venting on the peak ensures it doesn't catch and is very stable at speed. The vents are good at road speeds but don't provide a huge amount of airflow at low speed, making this more suited for pure road riders.

An outstanding lid in terms of its features, the Nexx does everything asked of it and comes with a five-year warranty. As well as an integrated sun visor, you get a Pinlock, peak extender, visor pouch, pads to alter the lining's fit, removable vent cover and a selection of parts to allow you to fit an intercom, helmet camera and even remove the visor entirely for use with goggles. Doing so is simple with no tools and the peak's angle can be altered by hand.

On the road, while the fit is snug, it is comfortable with a good field of vison, is fairly quiet, the sun visor is easily activated and it doesn't feel as heavy the scales say it is. The vents are effective and easily accessed with the chin vent's cover removable for low-speed air flow while the peak doesn't catch in the wind. An excellent do-it-all adventure lid that has very few negative points.

The Nexx is our peaky blinder

ADVENTURE LIDS ARE

incredibly complex bits of kit – something that was highlighted during out test.

And unlike some tests, the results were very close, with just six points covering the best and worst lids.

Why was this? As adventure helmets are a relatively new trend, many manufacturers have started from scratch, using new design techniques. This is something that isn't always the case with road lids, as some brands often retain a certain style or way of producing a road lid.

Due to this, manufacturers have ensured their lids tick every box, leading to similar results. There are a few areas that some stand out but generally speaking, they are all fairly close.

But there is always a winner and in this case, it is the Nexx X.WED2.

A lid so packed full of features yet still only just breaks the £300 bracket (making it the second cheapest in the test) the Nexx represents excellent value for money. Although a touch heavy, due to its features, this is a small sacrifice and it thoroughly deserves our Best Buy award. The Shoei Hornet ADV. Nolan N70-2 X and AGV AX-9 all deserve honourable mentions, though it is the Shoei that scoops the Recommended award.
